



In the **2021** school year, Lunch Buddies was re-piloted in two schools

Dr. Grace's research highlights "simple – not easy" ways proven to build resiliency in children and set them up for success, including: reading together regularly, sharing meals, and talking about their interests.

Donations to UWNEMN are invested in programs and agencies utilizing those exact strategies to Help Children Succeed in our region.

One growing UWNEMN program seeking to Help Children Succeed is the Lunch Buddies mentoring program, which was first piloted in 2020 in Hibbing schools, pairing 16 local adults with first graders in need of additional positive adult role models. The original pilot program was cut short due to the COVID-19 pandemic, but it returned in the spring of the 2021 school year – this time at Keewatin Elementary School and Merritt Elementary School in Mountain Iron.

Lunch Buddies mentors and mentors will meet each week through the remainder of the school year, sharing lunch, playing games, and building connections. Other schools across the region have already voiced interest in bringing Lunch Buddies to their school next school year.

In 2015, the free clinic in Ely closed. By 2016, volunteers from the former clinic saw the unmet need left by the closure and sprung to action, creating the Ely Community Health Center. In the last five years, the clinic has grown from serving 120 to 300 patients annually. The clinic attributes much of this success to the hiring of a paid executive director, made possible in part by support from UWNEMN.

When you unite your dollars with others across the region, you are making life-saving work like Ely Community Health Center's possible.

In the past year alone, Ely Community Health Center (ECHC)'s services have grown to include: weekly medical clinics for acute and chronic health conditions, insurance navigation services, hypertension screenings at the Ely Farmers Market and Ely Senior Center, a monthly cooking and nutrition class for local seniors, and the addition of dental services.

New ECHC Executive Director Helen Tome says the organization's biggest accomplishment in 2021 was continuing services throughout the COVID-19 pandemic while growing to include dental care.

"Dental has been a huge focus area in our community, and we've been able to make leaps and bounds in the past year," she said.

Donations to UWNEMN made a "huge difference" to ECHC throughout 2021, she added.

"Without the continuous support from our area (UWNEMN) donors we would not be able to operate ECHC," she said.

Your gifts to UWNEMN are invested in programs and agencies that meet immediate needs for neighbors in crisis, and oftentimes meeting these short-term needs has long-term effects.

Take, for example, UWNEMN's Buddy Backpacks program. The program provides nutritious, child-friendly meal kits to 1,000 local children at-risk of hunger every weekend and holiday break of the school year.

School staff, families, and service providers across the region agree the immediate impacts of the program are undeniable. When children receive Buddy Backpacks, their school attendance improves, their energy levels increase, and indicators of health improve.

Not as easy to see but just as important are the ramifications the program will make for enrolled children into adulthood. Children who do not have to worry about food are children set up for healthier, more successful futures.

UWNEMN's work to address childhood hunger does not end with the school year. In the summer months, our Meet Up and Chow Down program provides free summer lunches to any children ages 1-18, regardless of income-level.

In the summer of 2021, Meet Up and Chow Down lunches were served at nine sites in the communities of Aurora, Chisholm, Hibbing, Mt. Iron, Nashwauk, and Virginia. Volunteers handed out more than 11,000 Meet Up and Chow Down lunches – up from 8,000 from the previous summer.

A USDA-approved meal vendor and volunteer base is needed to bring Meet Up and Chow Down to new communities. If you would like to bring this program to your community and can help secure a meal vendor and/or coordinate volunteers, please contact michelle@unitedwaynemn.org!

Each year, UWNEMN provides grants to non-profit agencies and programming in Koochiching County and Lake of the Woods County, supported by fundraising in those communities. Fundraising in each community is as unique as the communities themselves.

In 2021 for example, International Falls Broncos Football Team decided to tackle the issue of childhood hunger, selecting UWNEMN's Buddy Backpacks program as the beneficiary of their Touchdowns and Turnovers program.

Touchdowns and Turnovers, now in its third year, has raised more than \$18,000 for local programs and agencies since its inception by asking local businesses for sponsorships then asking fans to donate during every touchdown and turnover of each home game to benefit the selected program of the year.

The team also sold t-shirts with proceeds going to Buddy Backpacks.

The football team isn't the only team supporting Buddy Backpacks in Koochiching County. A dedicated team of volunteers, led by Mike Silvers and Julie Ehrman distributes the weekend meal kits to schools throughout the county each month. The meal kits are transported from Chisholm to International Falls each month by Minnesota Industries.

More than 40 years ago, the Erspamer family lost everything they owned to a house fire in the dead of winter.

Not long after, the American Red Cross reached out and helped the family get needed items like clothing, jackets, and boots, immediately.

"I said we didn't need it; we had insurance," Ray Erspamer remembers. "They said it didn't matter."

Afterwards, when Ray was approached by coworkers at Hibbing Taconite and told they needed help with UWNEMN's campaign there, he volunteered.

"I said I'd been helped (by a UWNEMN partner agency), so I'd help," he said.

Despite his discomfort with public speaking, Ray shared his story to encourage others to help people in need.

"Everyone thinks if they have a good job, they won't need help," he said. "I had a good job. I had good insurance. I had everything you're supposed to have."

In the years to follow, Ray's volunteer roles with UWNEMN evolved, becoming the first "loaned employee" helping the (at-the time) one-person office in any capacity he could. From there, he served as a board member, board president, "and now," he says with a smile, "back to a worker."

Today, Ray picks up boxes of donated goods from partner stores across the state and delivers them to UWNEMN's building for the Comforts of Home program each month with wife Deb. Each week, he picks up boxes of Buddy Backpacks at UWNEMN's building and delivers them to the majority of schools across the region. Ray is considered a "lifetime lifesaver" for UWNEMN.

What keeps him so invested in UWNEMN?

"Once you understand what our local United Way does, you're hooked," he said. "If I run into someone who needs help, I know I can call UWNEMN. And maybe they can't fix it all, but they can get them on the path they need to solve – or at least contain – their problem."



VOLUNTEERS ARE THE BACKBONE OF OUR ORGANIZATION

As a staff of six full-time and one part-time employees, with a service area reaching from International Falls to Saginaw and Pengilly to Winton, there is no way we could provide the programming we do to families and individuals in our region without the support of volunteers.

Volunteer opportunities are far-ranging – both in time and tasks. Just as one dollar per person makes a tremendous impact in our community, so does one hour per volunteer.

Campaign volunteers help UWNEMN raise funds at workplaces across the region. The most successful workplace campaigns are the ones employees make their own. How can you help? In 2021, many of our events were once again canceled or altered due to safety concerns surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic. Luckily, as an independently run organization, UWNEMN is able to adapt to changes quickly, our staff is highly skilled in thinking on their feet, and our community remained committed to supporting UWNEMN throughout another challenging year.

Our most unique event change in 2021 was Flavor of the North Restaurant Month. For the month of May, UWNEMN promoted participating restaurants, and people across the region visited the restaurants to try the featured meals, voting for their favorite at the end of the month. Participating restaurants were also eligible for one of three \$2,500 COVID recovery grants thanks to a partnership with IRRR.

Diners supported local restaurants with their food purchases and supported UWNEMN's Buddy Backpacks through a corresponding virtual auction. Thank you to all who supported this unique twist on a favorite event, and congratulations again to Billy's Pit Stop Pub N Grub (best appetizer); Bailey's Courtyard Café (best entrée); and Black Bear Bakery, Kunnari's Kitchen & Coffee House, and Later Tater (tied for best dessert)!

GIFT PLANNING





DR. GEORGE ERICKSON

"When we look for people we want to help, we go to people we trust."

- Dr. George Erickson

Growing up in Virginia, Dr. George Erickson says he "was always inspired by people who shared." Together, he and wife of 65 years, Sally, themselves became people who shared, donating to local organizations and causes through the years, including spurring the creation of the Virginia Indoor Tennis & Pickleball Club.

Sally passed away this past September, and in her honor, Erickson has since presented more than \$300,000 in donations to local organizations – including \$50,000 to UWNEMN. The couple had decided to make this donation prior to Sally's passing.

"We decided a month before she knew she wasn't going to last much longer and wanted to do this now," he said when presenting the donation.


Erickson, a retired dentist, has traveled the world – everywhere from the Arctic to Australia, served on numerous community boards, and has written five books, including a best seller. He chalks up his successes to "growing up in good times, in a good country, with good parents" – and of course, to his late wife.

"Everything that's worked so well for me couldn't have happened without her," he said. "...Without (Sally's) encouragement and support, none of these contributions would have been possible."

Erickson said it has given he and his wife "great pleasure" over the years to see their donations in action. He said they chose to donate such a large amount to UWNEMN because of the organization's reach in the region and the trust local communities have placed in UWNEMN.

He said he hopes the gifts he and Sally have made inspire others to think about charitable giving "before they're gone."

GIFT PLANNING



Oftentimes, people have thought of gift planning only upon death, which could include naming a charity or non-profit organization as the beneficiary of certain assets, accounts, or life insurance policies. There are many benefits of doing so, including increasing the amount of the bequest (in the form of tax savings), leaving a legacy in one's own community, and decreasing the estate tax burden for your loved ones.

As the Ericksons' story so touchingly demonstrates, leaving a legacy through lifetime gift planning is another option, and one that allows the donor to witness the impact of their gift.

EXAMPLES OF LIFETIME GIFTING INCLUDE:

Donor-Advised Fund –This is a private fund administered by a third party for the purpose of managing charitable donations on behalf of an organization, family, or individual. These have become increasingly popular due to the ability of donors to maintain control over the placement and distribution of charitable gifts and also for the tax advantages that come with deposits into the fund.

Charitable Gift Annuity - This is an arrangement between a donor and non-profit organization in which the donor receives a lifetime payment based upon the value of assets gifted to the organization. This contract provides the donor with a tax deduction in the year the gift is made, lifetime income each year after that, and allow for the gifted assets to be retained by the charitable organization upon death of the donor. This can be done with a gift as small as \$5,000.

Gifts of Securities - By gifting shares of appreciated stock or bonds from an investment portfolio, donors avoid paying capital gains tax and receive a tax deduction of the gift's fair market value.

Charitable Trusts - These can be useful vehicles for a donor who wants to make a charitable donation but does not want to give an undivided interest to the charity. Utilizing a charitable trust (there are several different kinds) allow the donor to receive a charitable income tax deduction at the time of the gift, retain some right to enjoy the property gifted, and reduce the size of his or her taxable estate. Gifts of Real Estate - By gifting real estate, donors avoid paying capital gains tax and receive a tax deduction.
